RESOLUTIONS
OF
THE LEGISLATURE OF KANSAS
IN FAVOR OF

The passage of the bill (S. 462) to admit the State of Colorado into the Union, the objections of the President to the contrary notwithstanding.

FEBRUARY 20, 1867.-Ordered to lie on the table and be printed.

Whereas the people of Kansas have heard with surprise and regret that the President of the United States has vetoed the bill admitting Colorado as a State; and whereas we believe that the best interests of the nation and the necessities of our own State demand the immediate admission of the young golden State of the west: Therefore,

Resolved by the senate of the State of Kansas, (the house of representatives concurring,) That we, in the name of Kansas and of our common country, earnestly urge the Congress of the United States to pass the said bill, the objections of the President to the contrary notwithstanding.

Resolved, That our senators be, and are hereby instructed, and our representative be requested, to vote and give their influence for the passage of said bill over the President's veto.

Resolved, That the Secretary of State be, and is hereby instructed, immediately upon the passage of these resolutions, to forward a copy of the same to each of our senators and our representative in Congress.
